LIVES REMEMBERED

Geoff Meads - 17th August 1930 to 1st November 2016

A keen supporter of a number of charities, and a real gentleman of the old school, Geoff Meads has passed away. Lately of Kent House in Gislingham Road, he was 86 and had spent the last 27 months at Baylham Care Centre near Needham Market. This followed a major stroke he suffered the day after losing his beloved wife and soulmate, Angela in August 2014. They had been married 42 years. Angela had previously suffered a stroke which limited her movement and confined her to a wheelchair at home for two years. Geoff became her carer, with help four times a day, new arrangements which naturally greatly disturbed their former life.

Longer term villagers may remember the couple walking around the village with their family, two white Westies called Angus and Fergus, their "boys". Geoff loved his pipes, his whiskies, his music, the Royal Family and politics. Both he and Angela enjoyed Prime Minister's Question Time and keenly involved themselves, offering their own opinions loudly.

Geoff's funeral took place at Risby on 9th December. The couple bequeathed their entire estate to their favourite charities, the RNLI, RSPCA, Blind Veterans, and Guide Dogs for the Blind.

A Prisoner of Birth - by Jeffrey Archer

This is a story about a young man, Danny Cartwright, who is accused, charged and found guilty of murdering his best friend when they were out celebrating his engagement to his best friends sister at a wine bar.

There is no doubt about his innocence but when four prosecution witnesses are a barrister, a popular actor, an aristocrat and the youngest partner in an established firm's history, who is going to believe his side of the story.

Danny is sentenced to 22 years and is sent to Belmarsh prison, the highest security jail in the land, from where no inmate has ever escaped.

But everyone has underestimated Danny's determination to seek revenge and his fiancée's relentless quest to win justice.

It is apparent that Jeffrey Archer has used his own personal experiences to put together a very enjoyable story.



URGENT!

It has come to my attention that there has been a spike in burglaries in Diss specifically but in general, all over.

This is that time of year when evenings are dark and we all have new products in our homes so I have put together some tips to keep your homes safe this winter.

Get your lights on timers so they come on while you are out when its dark.

Leave a radio on but choose a station with lots of talking not music.

Ensure window locks are used and remove the keys.

Make sure your sheds and garages are locked and secured. Sheds are a particularly soft target yet are filled with power tools, mowers and the like.

Keep an eye on neighbours houses especially if you know no-one is home.

Lock your side and back gates so no-one can get into your back garden. train brambles, roses etc. to grow along the top of the fence to put anyone off climbing over. Carpet gripper rods (that hold your carpets down) can be nailed to the top of your fence. No-one will want to climb over with those on there and if anyone asks, they are there to keep squirrels out the garden....

Don't leave valuables on show in your home. Handbags, laptops, games consoles and jewellery are all easily carried away and a temptation. hide them away from sight.

Don't leave valuables on show in your car when shopping. Buying presents, taking them to your car and going back to the shops again is asking for trouble. Hide them in your boot and check to see if anyone is watching.

Finally if you see anyone who looks suspicious then call 101 or if a crime is taking place dial 999.

Despite the police having little interest in Neighbourhood Watch now I am still continuing as coordinator so if you are not sure and just want someone to pop round to give advice on security or someone is hanging around and you want someone to come round and speak to them, feel free to call or text me on 07795 078125.

Parish Council News

Firstly, a Happy New Year to you all. Hopefully, it will be a good one with all your dreams and wishes coming true.

As the Council move into 2017, we hope that we have served the Village the best we can with the resources available to us. We have a very limited amount of money to do all the projects we would like to and therefore, we have to try and prioritise them. One aspect that has been brought to our notice this year is the number of trees which required attention (and therefore, money spent on them). Many of them are getting old and require minor surgery to prevent them being a danger to passersby.

Taking the slide out of service due to rot in the timbers was a big blow, especially as a new one costs in the region of £4000. We are still endeavouring to obtain a grant for this but it is a long and uphill battle.

Quite a while ago, we experimented with a Parish Council Surgery in the Pub on a Saturday morning, once a month. This was a dismal failure so, it was discontinued. However, we intend to resurrect it for a 6 month trial period at the Book & Coffee Sale, held in the Church on the last Saturday of the month. There will be at least one Councillor in attendance who will be available to take note of any questions and comments (good or bad) you have. Please come and talk to us; it is the only way we know if we are on the right track!



NEWS FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL

Your Parish Council

I write this in response to a recent question posed by a local resident – "What does the Parish Council do?"

A parish council is a civil local authority and is the first tier of local government. They are elected bodies, have variable tax raising powers, and are responsible for areas known as civil parishes.

All meetings are open to members of the public, in fact they are encouraged to attend, so you could find out by coming along to the next meeting. In the meantime, a good council:

- Plays a vital part in representing the interests of the community it serves
- Improves the quality of life of local people and the local environment
- Influences other decision makers, for example, in planning matters
- Delivers services to meet local needs
- Works with other groups in the community to develop the community and provide better services to the electors

We make all kinds of decisions on issues that affect the community. Probably the most common topics are planning matters, crime prevention, managing open spaces and campaigning for and delivering better services and facilities.

In Finningham, we have responsibility for the upkeep and maintenance of the churchyard, cemetery, village green, footpaths and byways; provision of litter, dog waste and salt bins. We provide and maintain recreational facilities (children's play area, picnic benches), the war memorial, village sign and flagpole.

Councillors work to a Code of Conduct (often referred to as The Nolan Principles) which are: Selflessness, Integrity, Objectivity, Accountability, Openness, Honesty, Leadership and Stewardship.

SEASONAL LOWDOWN



The legend of St Valentine

The history of Valentine's Day and the story of its patron saint is shrouded in mystery. We do know that February has long been celebrated as a month of romance, and that St Valentine's Day, as we know it today, contains vestiges of both Christian and ancient Roman tradition. But who was Saint Valentine, and how did he become associated with this ancient rite?

The Catholic Church recognises at least three different saints named Valentine or Valentinus, all of whom were martyred. One legend contends that Valentine was a priest who served during the third century in Rome. When Emperor Claudius II decided that single men made better soldiers than those with wives and families, he outlawed marriage for young men. Valentine, realising the injustice of the decree, defied Claudius and continued to perform marriages for young lovers in secret. When Valentine's actions were discovered, Claudius ordered that he be put to death.

Other stories suggest that Valentine may have been killed for attempting to help Christians escape harsh Roman prisons. According to one legend, an imprisoned Valentine actually sent the first "valentine" greeting himself after he fell in love with a young girl—possibly his jailor's daughter—who visited him during his confinement. Before his death, it is alleged that he wrote her a letter signed "From your Valentine," an expression that is still is use today. By the Middle Ages, perhaps thanks to his reputation, Valentine would become one of the most popular saints in England and France.

While some believe that Valentine's Day is celebrated in the middle of February to commemorate the anniversary of Valentine's death or burial, others claim that the Christian church may have decided to place St. Valentine's feast day in the middle of February in an effort to "Christianise" the pagan celebration of Lupercalia. Celebrated at the ides of February, or February 15, Lupercalia was a fertility festival dedicated to Faunus, the Roman god of agriculture, as well as to the Roman founders Romulus and Remus.

To begin the festival, members of the Luperci, an order of Roman priests, would gather at a sacred cave where the infants Romulus and Remus, were believed to have been cared for by a she-wolf or lupa. The priests would sacrifice a goat, for fertility, and a dog, for purification. They would strip the goat's hide into strips, dip them into the sacrificial blood and take to the streets, gently slapping both women and crop fields with the goat hide. Roman women welcomed the touch of the hides because it was believed to make them more fertile in the coming year. Later in the day, all the young women in the city would place their names in a big urn. The city's bachelors would each choose a name and become paired for the year with his chosen woman. These matches often ended in marriage.

MAKE AND DO

Christmas Pudding Wontons

You have, no doubt, already read many ideas as to how you can use up left-over turkey but what about the half eaten Christmas pudding?

Here is an idea that you may find useful.

<u>Ingredients</u>

- Christmas Pudding
- Filo pastry
- Chopped nuts/dried fruit/glace cherries
- 1. Soak the dried fruit in any left over festive drinks.
- 2. Cut the filo pastry into squares approximately 6 inches x 6 inches (I know, that has given my age away!)
- 3. Take four squares of the filo pastry and brush with melted butter. Stack up on top of each other to form a star.
- 4. Crumble the Christmas pudding and mix in your choice of nuts and/or dried fruits. (To make the mixture lighter you can add some chopped apple or tangerine).
- 5. Form into small balls and place in the centre of the filo pastry. A glace cherry in the middle adds an extra touch.
- 6. Fold the two top layers of file pastry to form a parcel. Bring the other filo layers up to form a wonton.
- 7. Brush with melted butter and bake at 170°c (fan 160°c) for fifteen to twenty mins until golden brown.
- 8. Enjoy with cream, crème fraiche or custard.
