

# SEASONAL LOWDOWN

### **Festive Season**

When the shops are full of Christmas decorations you know it will soon be Christmas. But Christmas isn't just about Santa Claus and gifts under the tree.

If you have ever had an Advent Calendar you will know that the idea is to open a numbered door each day from 1st December to Christmas Eve. Behind each door is a surprise, often chocolate but have you ever wondered why we have Advent Calendars and what Advent is all about?

Advent marks the start of the Christian year. It is the four weeks before Christmas, beginning on November 30 or the nearest Sunday to it. This is the Church's New Year's Day. The word Advent comes from the Latin 'adventus' which means 'arrival' or 'coming'. This is the time for Christians to prepare for celebration of the birth of Jesus and look forward to the time that Jesus will come again.

The clergy usually wear purple or royal blue clothing in their churches during Advent. During Advent no flowers decorate churches, but it is usual to have an Advent Crown also known as an Advent Wreath. These are made from a circle of evergreen plants like holly and ivy which symbolises God with no beginning or end. The evergreen is a reminder that God does not change. The holly is also a symbol of the crown of thorns that Jesus wore when he was crucified. Four candles are fixed round the circle with another in the middle.

Various colours of candles have been used such as three purple and a pink with one white in the middle. Unlit candles represent darkness. One purple candle is lit on the first Sunday of Advent. On the second Sunday it is lit again together with another purple one, the third purple one is lit on the third Sunday and on the fourth Sunday the pink candle is included. On Christmas Day the white candle is also lit representing Jesus Christ as the light of the world. Sometimes four red candles and one white are used, red being a colour associated with Christmas.

What do the Advent Candles stand for?

- 1. The candle of Hope so prayers on this day focus on hope.
- 2. This candle is a symbol of God's Peace, reminding Christians of the Prophets who said that the Messiah would be born.
- 3. The candle of Love, represents John the Baptist who baptised Jesus.
- 4. The candle of Joy reminds Christians of Jesus' mother, Mary.
- 5. The fifth candle reminds Christians of the birth of Jesus.


# NEIGHBOURHOOD TEAM

### Speed watch

The community speed watch scheme for Finningham has been agreed and signed off. We now have to raise the money to buy the signs and speed gun. Lesley at Lawes has very generously agreed to donate the high viz coats which is a great help. The agreed sites are village sign at the crossroads, entrance to the green, driveway of the Old Post Office and farm entrance on the left just before the water tower.

The latest news on reducing the speed limit from Robb Hall corner is that the county council seem to be in no rush to reply to me but I do have the support of our MP Jo Churchill. Although she has no authority over Highways, she is putting pressure on our behalf.

My next plan is to hold some kind of demonstration at Robb Hall corner



and invite Anglia News, local papers etc to add to the pressure on Highways dept. Their main objection seems to be the £5,000 cost of implementing a new speed limit. They do seem happy with my suggestion it should be 40mph not national speed limit though. Please feel free to let me know any ideas you may have to push the county council.

# **Finningham Parish Council**

There is a limited supply of 30mph Wheelie Bin stickers available from the Parish Council. Those who live on through roads, within the 30mph speed limit, are welcome to have two for their Wheelie Bins.

They will be available (FOC) at Tea @ Bart's and the Coffee & Book Sales. Both events are held monthly in the Church. Tea @ Bart's is on every third Tuesday afternoon from 2:30 to 4:30. The Cake and Book Sales are held every last Saturday morning from 10:00 to 12:30.

It is great pride that the Parish Council announces that our War Memorial has been granted Listed Status. It was obviously a good move to have it cleaned in time for the centenary of the outbreak of World War I. Not only does it grace our Churchyard, it is now an important item as it is a "Building of Special Architectural or Historic Interest". The memorial is now listed at Grade II.

We are busy trying to get Grants in order that we may replace some of the old equipment in our play area on the Green. The swings do not meet the current safety requirements (although, they still can be used quite safely). However, the slide has been withdrawn from use, as it has a bit of rot in some of the supports and it would not be economic to bring it up to the required standard. We need to dispose of it, preferably at no cost to the Parish Council. If you know of anyone who would like it (possibly for home use) please contact any one of the Council Members.

For those who are continually frustrated with the Internet performance in the village (aren't we all??), you will be interested to know that Mid Suffolk are taking up the issue. Hopefully, something good will come of their intervention but, don't bank on it. From the stories I receive about Fibre from neighbouring villagers, it could be a mixed blessing, until they all sort themselves out. Perhaps we should be careful what we wish for.

Make your own Christingle with our easy to follow guide.

### You will need:

1 orange, 1 small candle (a birthday cake candle will be fine), enough red ribbon to go round an orange with a small overlap (or a bit more for a bow), 4 cocktail sticks, a few sweets or some dried fruit such as raisins or sultanas, small piece of foil measuring about 4cm by 4cm pencil to make a hole in the orange



### What you do:

- 1. Carefully push the pencil into the top of the orange to make a small hole.
- 2. Put about 3 sweets or dried fruit onto the cocktail sticks.
- 3. Push the cocktail sticks into the orange in four different directions slightly above the fattest part of the orange and pointing slightly upwards.
- 4. Take the foil and gently wrap it around the candle at the bottom before firmly wedging the candle into the hole that you had made in the orange. Once in position mould the foil into a shallow cup shape to catch any drips of candle wax.
- 5. Tie the ribbon round the orange and fasten with a bow, or just overlap the two ends, and secure with a pin to keep it in place.
