Thanks to the generous discount offered by Roots and Shoots in Stowmarket we ended up with close to 2000 daffodil bulbs to be planted around the village. A sterling effort from volunteers has seen most of these now planted. There are still a few left if you would like to get involved. We will await the results of our efforts in the Spring.

We have two events over the Winter period to look forward to. The first is the village Christmas Meal on Sunday  $3^{rd}$  December. This year the meal is open to all residents and will be held at the Stoke Ash White Horse again by popular demand. The cost will be £10.00 with the remainder being subsidised by FOF. There are only 50 places so do book yours early.

On January the  $27^{\text{th}}$  we will have a Burns Night Supper followed by dancing in Westhorpe Village Hall. This will be our first joint venture with Westhorpe. Tickets will be £10.00 but limited to 60 places again. Please see the details elsewhere in the magazine.

The Council was delighted by the response and has undertaken to carry out as many of the ideas and suggestions as it can. This should be considered as an on-going process and we welcome comments, favourable, or otherwise regarding our progress in the implementation of the points raised.





### ST BARTHOLOMEW'S CHURCH



During a recent conversation on the doorstep of the Rectory with some visiting members of the Jehovahs Witness organisation, the topic centred around the outlawing of their sect in Russia and all the implications behind that decision. At the same time we spoke about the persecution and imprisonment of their members in many of the countries which were once part of the old USSR. I may be far removed from their beliefs, but as a Christian and active member of Amnesty International I am always appalled at intolerance and injustice in the world.

Christians of course have never been immune to persecution themselves, and it is estimated that Christians suffer in one form or another in over 100 countries around the world today. Indeed it is widely recognised that Christians are the most persecuted religious group in the world. Figures suggest that during the 20<sup>th</sup> century more Christians died through their faith than all the preceding centuries put together.

November is a month when we remember those who have died whether as Christian martyrs, through war or otherwise. All Saints Day starts us off on the 1<sup>st</sup> of the month, followed by All Souls Day on the 2<sup>nd</sup> when we remember those dear to us, and we move on to our Services of Remembrance for those who have died as a result of conflict, and through their sacrifice have allowed us the freedom we share in our society in this country today.

Amongst the many and varied martyrs the Church remembers at this time of year is East Anglia's 'own son' St Edmund; whose Feast Day falls on the 20<sup>th</sup> of November. Known as King of the East Angles, Edmund was King from his early youth in the middle of the 9<sup>th</sup> century, and a committed Christian, taking time out to study the scriptures. Edmund repelled the invading Danes on several occasions but was to be finally defeated by the Danes somewhere near to Hoxne in Suffolk. It is said that Edmund would not accept the terms of surrender because of his Christian faith and subsequently was used as arrow practice before being beheaded. In the 10<sup>th</sup> century Edmunds bones were moved to Beodricsworth, later known as Bury St Edmunds, and the Abbey built there became a popular place of pilgrimage. Bury St Edmunds finally became a Cathedral City in 1914 with the creation of the Diocese of St Edmundsbury and Ipswich, of which we are a part.

November gives way to December and the season of Advent, traditionally a time of reflection leading up to Christmas, although with the hustle and bustle of the Christmas preparations such reflection can often be somewhat neglected. Advent is above all a time of hope and anticipation, leading through the celebrations of Christmas and on to the New Year with all that 2018 may bring. As I am writing this in mid-October both Advent and December seem rather a long way off; but by the time the next magazine comes out we will be in the New Year, so may Denise and I wish all our readers every joy and blessing this coming Christmas.

### FOUR SEASONS

Autumn is rapidly sinking into winter – so I will cling to memories of an excellent summer. As an add-on to the usual staycation we had a week in France. Soon after our ailing campervan rolled off the ferry it was becoming clear that the French do things differently. For example, on our first evening beside the sea at Boulogne (the sort of place where any English council would plant a sign saying "no overnight parking" - and feel that their job was done) here was an area just for motorhomes and a sign saying something like "Welcome, for €7 per night you can stay for up to 48 hours and make use of the basic facilities. A baker will call in the morning." We walked around the British war cemetery, climbed Napoleon's column (it's higher than Nelson's, wonderful views), wondered about the men who defended and attacked the German pillboxes which are spread along the beach (erosion has toppled them from the cliff tops), swam as the sun set and were more than happy to spend our money at the aquarium and supermarket. The peaches I bought there were ripe and full of flavour - our stores apparently can't achieve this. I was surprised to find that even the service station had perfect croissants. Food in general is just better and I ate too much - then wondered why the French are, on average, obviously thinner than we are. I thought they were supposed to be rude - but in every encounter they waited politely until I had run out of "Google-French" before answering my guery in English.

I came home thinking that although the Duke of Wellington, William Marshal etc. were no doubt trying to help, if Suffolk had finished up as a *département* we would be healthier and happier – and the baguettes would be so much nicer.

#### Teas, Cakes and Books in the church


The teas, cakes and books in the church on the day of the garage sale raised the mighty figure of  $\pounds$ 371 for The Church Fabric Fund.

### BOOK REVIEW

It will not be long before we will be reminded how many days it is to Christmas. I, therefore, decided to review a couple of books for two groups who you might find it difficult to cater for at this festive time: teenagers and grandparents.

#### Surgically Enhanced by Pam Ayres

Pam Ayres writes poems about everyday events with a quirky and humorous stance. Her poems are not stuffy. The loose-leaf cover of this book has an example,

BONEMEAL

Bury me beside my dogs, The dogs I loved and Knew, So as in life, they'll never be Short of a bone to chew.

The poems in this book are inter-dispersed with recollections of different events in her life. It is a book which can be read at any time when you want a little pick-meup.

Now for the teenagers. In a previous review I commented on James Patterson's publishers saying that the author was keen to get children to read. He is not the only one because I have come across a series of books by John Grisham. They are about a thirteen year old boy called Theodore Boone. Both his parents are lawyers and has, therefore, become interested in all matters legal.

The titles are:-

Theodore Boone Theodore Boone: The Abduction Theodore Boone: The Accused Theodore Boone: The Activist Theodore Boone: The Fugitive Theodore Boone: The Scandal

I have read The Scandal and it centres around school and I believe many teenagers will relate to Theodore and how he feels about aspects of school life, particularly tests, which in my day was called the 11+. In fact the story in this book is relevant today in this country. In September 2017 there was media coverage about teachers 'enhancing' pupils scores in test to push their schools up the league tables.

### INSIGHTS



#### The loneliness of the long distance Curlew runner.

Have you noticed how one's most poignant memories are often soundscapes? The discordant clang of the Horse Guards clock chiming the quarters transports me to younger, military days and preparation for duty on Queen's Life Guard. Lapping waves, laughter and shrieks and I am whisked to childhood holidays in North Devon. The haunting *whaup, whaup whaup* call of the Curlew conjures up Reydon marshes...its a sound that, to me, means home. Having recently taken a trip to 'The Smoke' I took a detour via Horse Guards and can happily report the clock over Wellington's office continues to clank every fifteen minutes, children are still as raucous on beaches, yet sadly the plaintive call of the Curlew was absent from the Reydon marshes as I ran through one of its reed lined tunnel like paths last weekend.

It is that missing echo of home that led me to embark upon my own effort to raise money for and awareness of the GWCT's Curlew Appeal. How could such an evocative sound, such an iconic part of my life have just gone silent ? The news that there are less than 500 Curlew south of Birmingham is tragic, yet thanks to the research undertaken by the GWCT it appears that this decline can be halted and reversed. Of course to get this information out to land owners and managers, and the Conservation tools they need to utilise costs money. If I was a wealthy man I would simply open my cheque book, write out a suitably generous donation and return to my life. Sadly a career spent largely enjoying myself in the countryside has caused ongoing atrophy of the wallet. I am blessed however with good health, a pair of legs that work and lungs that, despite too many years smoking too many cigarettes, seem to combine and help to propel me over long distances.

My positive physical attributes therefore have been put to the use of the GWCT. I have set myself the task of running the Northumberland Coastal Path Marathon in February next year. For those of you unaware of St Cuthbert's way I will, along with 300 or so other lunatics, be running 27 miles from Alnwick to Bamburgh through sand hills, soft dunes, wide expanse of beach, shingle, marram grass and, seeing as the race is in February, howling North Easterly winds and a fair smattering of sleet squalls. I ran the London Marathon eight years ago in aid of the Jockey Club's Charity, Racing Welfare but the Capital's slog will be a breeze compared with this "extreme race". My training thus far sees me running around 30 miles per week mainly across country and I will start winding that up as the nights draw in (wildfowling commitments permitting!)

Four years ago he realised his long term ambition and set up his own business designing and building wildlife friendly gardens and landscapes.
