


FROM THE EDITORS

Probably the most important news that has been released since the last issue of this Newsletter is the proposal to build 7 houses on a piece of land next to the last bungalow on the left-hand side on Westhorpe Road.

It is early days yet but there are probably some contentious issues surrounding this proposal, as there are on the Green Farm Yard development. One of the main items that immediately comes to mind is that the sewage from this new development will feed into the existing system, thus exacerbating the whole situation even further. If you want to see what is proposed, just visit the MSDC Planning website under the reference DC/18/02313. As a start, the Highways department are not happy with the visibility for vehicles exiting the site. Although, the Architects have already produced a revised block plan acceding to the visibility requirements.

Our resident Green grass cutter, Andy Brownlie, has decided to give up the contract from the Parish Council. We thank him for his past work for what has proved to be, a difficult job.

The Friends of Finningham Committee are working very hard to bring a stupendous occasion to the village in August (18^{th}). From what we have learnt, it is going to be quite something. All it needs now is to be fully supported by as many residents as possible.

The new swings on the Green seem to be a hit with the younger members of our community; we are now working towards replacing the slide. We have already received some grants towards it and, hopefully we shall be able to top them up with additional grants or donations to enable us to go ahead with the project.

ST BARTHOLOMEW'S CHURCH

By the time you read this publication, the Feast Day of St Peter will have been and gone, having been celebrated on the 29th June. Petertide, as the period around the Feast Day is known, is the season for those who are called to the Ministry within the Church as Deacons or Priests, to be Ordained. This year there are to be 25 Deacons and 9 Priests to be Ordained in our Cathedral at Bury St Edmunds by Bishop Martin, and then sent out to whatever Parishes they are to serve within our Diocese.

Deacons will have been training for the Priesthood, and upon Ordination will receive their licence as it were to serve as Curates, wearing the 'dog-collar' for the first time. After a year it would be usual for the Deacons to then be Ordained as Priests.

Of the 25 Deacons, 4 will take up full- time paid posts, whilst the remaining 21 will stay within their local Parish giving whatever service to their communities that they are able. Similarly the 9 candidates for Priesthood, having served this last year as Deacons, will be a mix of full-time and non-stipendiary.

Over the past few years this Diocese has seen a fall in the number of clergy, and so the high figures for Ordination this year is to be welcomed. The Diocese will be faced with financial challenges paying for an increasing number of clergy, but I understand that this will be off-set in a few years' time, because projected figures show a considerable drop in clergy due to forthcoming retirements. I understand that our Diocese has more multi-parish Benefices (ours for example has 6 churches) than any other Diocese in England, so it is imperative for candidates to come forward for Ordination, to serve as 'local Priests,' to alleviate the burden upon fulltime clergy. On a personal note, within this Benefice I have a retired member of the clergy; Reverend Pamela Robson, to whom I am grateful for her assistance, along with Lay Readers and Lay Elders, to whom I am equally grateful.

Petertide is the season for Ordinations, and it was St Peter (the word in Aramaic means 'rock'), whom Jesus declared He would build His Church upon. In artwork Peter is symbolised by 'keys', as it was to Peter that Jesus gave the 'keys' to heaven. Yet Peter was a very impetuous man, often inconsistent and rash, and of course the disciple who denied his Master when Christ was nailed to the cross: which all goes to show that even the Saints were never perfect. Peter was to die a martyrs death in Rome through crucifixion.







ST BARTHOLOMEW'S CHURCH

CHURCH OPENING HOURS /CHURCHYARD and FABRIC

In the previous publication I asked whether there were any people in the village who would be willing to open the church on a daily basis. The response was tremendously positive, and as such the church is now being opened on a daily basis; I am very grateful to all concerned.

In the same publication I also mentioned the five year Architects Quinquennial Report, of which I was awaiting upon the findings. I have now received the report and taken it to the Parochial Church Council (PCC).

The findings are laid out in an order of 'A-E,' with 'A' being high priority; and the Architect estimates that if all the work was undertaken (in reality this just does not happen, but is basically a wish list) the cost would be in excess of £30,000; which is by no means a great amount for such a church. At present the PCC is prioritising the 'A' list which was thankfully very short; and quotes are awaited for the following items which were highlighted.

An unsafe monument in the churchyard.

A complete electrical test of the inside of the church.

Servicing of the counterbalance and pulleys to both the font and rood screen.

In addition I have been informed this week that the bells are not to be rung until they have been professionally inspected; I have asked for this to be done.

Once these areas have been covered the PCC can look at those items highlighted under Priority 'B.'

I will endeavour to keep you informed, and as always am grateful for your help through both practical and financial contributions; 'thank you.'

The Late Show by Michael Connelly

INSIGHTS

And breathe

Breath is very important to our whole lives, but because it is mainly a subconscious activity we don't give it much thought. A study from March 2017 has discovered that our brain has a connection between our breathing and our brain rhythm and that circuit has an internal pace maker. This means that we have a way of influencing our brain rhythm OUR BREATH. Slower controlled breath creates a calmer brain. This is probably why there are such large benefits from meditation and yoga, where there is a focus on your breath.

In fact just the other day I was travelling to a meeting and I could feel my anxiety level rising. At that point I checked my breathing and there it was; shallow and high in my chest. As soon as I realised this I took a good deep belly breath, exhaled slowly in a controlled way and felt myself relax.

We need a good breathing discipline to nourish our body and mind. As children we breathe deeply and naturally, but as we grow we lose this natural breath. Our breathing becomes shallow meaning we keep a large amount of stagnant air in our lungs. Every part of our body needs oxygen to survive and if we are not taking in enough then something has to miss out.

It is easy to improve your breathing. A very good and simple place to start is to be aware of it. Just a reminder several times a day to tune into your breath can have great benefits.

You can also lay on your back with your hand on your stomach and feel your abdomen rise and fall with each breath. This is done breathing naturally, forced breath is unhelpful. Concentrate on your out breath or exhale.

You could try a yoga breathing technique like <u>https://www.drweil.com/health-wellness/body-mind-spirit/stress-anxiety/breathing-three-exercises/</u> Remember to build up to the full exercise if at first you find it challenging.

You could also take up meditation.

One thing to remember is, if you notice a sensation in your body as I did with the anxiety, check how you are breathing.



4 SEASONS

My summer began in The Netherlands – where conservation is given a higher priority. Many birds that are uncommon here are numerous there. So many nightingales! There are still plenty of birds to be seen here of course, and I have recently had some interesting encounters. I met a red kite as I was biking through Cotton, it was cruising slowly at lamp-post height. These birds are steadily widening their range; I now regularly see them at Stansted and Heathrow – where I'm sure they are not welcome. They are mainly carrion feeders so their behaviour has something in common with that of vultures, but they can take small live animals. This has caused some concern with pet owners - such as the woman in Berkshire who was less than pleased when one tried to make off with her Pomeranian.

It was at the western extreme of the M25 (northbound, approaching junction 19) where I was very surprised to see what I took to be an ostrich, but now think might have been a rhea. It was strolling in a scrubby meadow where I sometimes see deer. It was probably a farmed bird but I like to think it might have been a wild one – there has been the odd report of stray rheas. (I do look at the road sometimes).




