NEW BEGINNINGS

As you read this article, for many the summer holidays will either have ended or be drawing to a close. Perhaps some of you have been away on holiday, or taken a day out over the summer; a journey with a purpose that provides opportunity to see something new and do something different. Returning to our usual routine, after such a break, we can find that the experience has given us a new perspective; a desire to make changes in our life or to embark on a new venture.

People of all ages, pupils and teachers, are embarking on a new school year, some for the first time; others returning after the summer holidays or perhaps moving on to different schools or colleges. They may be happy and excited, perhaps uncertain and apprehensive, but for each of them it will be a time of new experiences and new opportunities, and through teaching and hard work, new skills will be developed and existing abilities improved.

But education and training are not simply about academic achievement or career development. Training and education are not quite the same thing. Training develops the skills we need for specific tasks, but education equips us for life, a life that we live in relationship with one another and with God.

Towards the end of September we enter the period called Michaelmas; the Feast of St Michael and All Angels. This period is associated with the beginning of autumn and the shortening of days. It used to be said that harvest had to be completed by Michaelmas, almost like the marking of the end of the productive season and the beginning of the new cycle of farming. It was a time at which new servants were hired, land was exchanged and debts were paid, and so Michaelmas came to be the time for electing magistrates and also the beginning of legal and university terms.

However these New Beginnings come in many shapes and forms and do not cease when we stop growing. More than ever, men and women of all ages find themselves making a fresh start; a second career, changed family circumstances, maybe even a renewed sense of being drawn to explore the deeper things of life.

Each one of us is part of a wider society; family and neighborhood, schools and the places where we work or spend our spare time. Here we learn social interaction and develop inter-personal skills such as conversation and listening, patience and tolerance. We grow in relationship with those around us, working together and growing in mutual understanding. Each person has their individual personality and brings their own abilities to a shared enterprise which will benefit the community as a whole.

Through the teaching and example of Jesus we learn how to become fully human and to discern God's purpose for our lives. Each individual is enabled by God's grace to use their own particular abilities for the benefit of all, so that we can live in love and harmony with one another and grow in relationship with Him. To that end Jesus promises to be with us at all times and in all places until our School of Life is over, and He brings us to share with Him in the life and light of His eternal kingdom.





FINNINGHAM'S ROLL OF HONOUR

Samuel Sillett was born in 1884 in Wickham Skeith to Charles Sillett and Emma Garrard. Charles was born in Finningham and Emma in Wickham Skeith; their 9 children were born in Finningham, Wickham Skeith and Gislingham.

'Samuel's father was born in 1850 in Finningham and died in 1917. His mother died in 1932. She lived with Edith. They lived in the house behind a chapel now demolished. The house was once used as a youth hostel. Samuel's widow later married Albert Haddock and they lived at Sutton, Isle of Ely. Samuel's photo, in army uniform always hung on the wall above the kitchen table. I visited them as a small child. David Sillet is Sam's grandson; we have not met for50 to 60 years. His elder brother is called Sam, after the grandfather. Sam and myself are 79 years old now but remember days gone very well .My great grand parents are buried in the untidy part of the cemetery-there is no marker.'

Peter Childerstone, descended from Edith, Samuel's sister.

The Youth Hostel, where Samuel's mother Emma lived with her daughter Edith, is behind the chapel. There were no Silletts there or nearby in 1939. The chapel was built in 1878; The cottage to its left was owned by Thomas Sillett in 1839 and 'Syllet'in 1804. The only one of these to have been demolished is to the right of the chapel.

In 1909 Samuel married Lily Easterbrook from Lewisham which is where they were living in 1911. The census confirms that Samuel was from Wickham Skeith so we know he's the right one. Samuel and Lily were to have two boys – Ernest W S in 1912 and George E A in 1916 both in Lewisham.

1891, Botesdale Road, Finningham, near the chapel. Only Edith (b.1893) is missing.

According to the Roll of Honour, Samuel signed up for the Northumberland Fusiliers in March 1917 and was reported missing in August 1917. The Commonwealth War Graves Commission records Samuel *Syllet's* death as the 8th August 1917. There is no known burial and his name is to be found on panel 5 of the memorial at Nieuport in Belgium. Samuel Sillett's medal card presumes him dead. 'Soldiers Who Died in the Great War' also have him as *Syllet* and state his birthplace as Lewisham. Although this isn't true, it *is* the place where he was

living at the time of his enlistment. All confirm that he was in the 16th Battalion of the Northumberland Fusiliers and that his rank and service number were Private 37101. [There is a story circulating that Samuel was missing but that he returned but there is no evidence to support it. Fortunately, Samuel's family have been in touch and put this myth to bed but it is unnerving how rumours acquire credibility the more times they are shared.]

'My father remembers his mother receiving the telegram telling her of the death of Samuel. My brother still has it. I did years ago bring my father to Finning-ham to show him where his father was born although the cottages have gone now. I also spoke to a lady from Elsey's Farm who said one of my uncles worked for them. It seems Samuel is well represented in St Bartholomew's Church. I would like to see the church records again for 1917 where granddad is mentioned.

My records show he was killed in WEST VLAANDEREN BELGIUM. The memorial is in Nieuport Cemetery, Belgium.

I recall my father saying that years after the war a man who was in the army with Samuel said that he was blown up by a hand grenade. Samuel was launching grenades using a David's Sling method. One man held the mortar in a sling ready to launch it and another pulled the pin. However this one fell out of the sling and detonated. This is the story told by the man who was with Samuel at the time (but not too close) who sought out my father after the war.' David Sillett, Samuel's grandson.

DONKEYS ON THE GREEN

Tesco's Bags of Help project has already delivered over £56 million to more than 16,000 projects across Britain. Tesco customers get the chance to vote for three different groups every time they shop. Every other month, when votes are collected, three groups in each of Tesco's regions will be awarded funding.

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
