
KNITTED OR CROCHETED POPPY APPEAL

Village Litter Pick & Churchyard Clean-up



ST BARTHOLOMEW'S CHURCH

During the month of May the Christian Church celebrates Ascension Day, Pentecost; known as the birthday of the Church, and also Trinity Sunday. The reading set aside in our churches for Trinity Sunday is that forthright passage from the book of Isaiah (c6, v1-8), where we are informed that the prophet receives a vision from God. The setting is the 8th century BC in Judah; now modern day Israel, and God is searching for a prophet to tell the people of His (God) love and forgiveness, and Isaiah duly takes up the challenge with the immortal words, 'Here am I; Send me!'

Last Trinity I visited a village in Derbyshire, Eyam. During a 14 month period in 1665/1666, Eyam was horrendously affected by the Great Plague. The disease was decimating the population of London, and had reached Eyam courtesy of infected linen sent from the capital. The Plague of course was notoriously infectious, and once caught, death was almost inevitable. The Rector of the time, a young man of 28 years by the name of William Mompesson, proposed that all the villagers stay within the confines of the village so as to contain the disease. This duly happened with food being left at the outskirts of the village by other Derbyshire villagers. The disease never spread from Eyam to other parts of the county.

Such fortitude by the folk of Eyam did not come without a price; the church records show that at least 273 people died of the Plague, and it is estimated that less than a quarter of the population of 1665 survived, indeed, the wife of the Rector was among the fatalities. Although this is now history by 350 years, the church still to this day holds an annual service of remembrance, and it is impossible not to be struck by a sense of awe at the bravery and selflessness of those villagers.

In today's world of instant news, where atrocities of war, and the horrors of natural disasters are beamed continually into our lives, greed and a lack of integrity combined with a culture of 'me me me' seem so commonplace, it is easy to despair and feel a sense of hopelessness in the world. However, all of us are called to rise above the squalid nature of what we know is a wrongdoing, and one thing I have learnt in life is that even the most basic kindness or offer of help, however miniscule, can and does contribute to making this world of ours a better place to inhabit; and let us never forget that Christians do not, and never have had the monopoly in good deeds, but by His example I think Christ would expect His disciples on earth to lead the way.

None of us are likely to be called in such dramatic fashion as Isaiah and William Mompesson to help those around us. Yet as I come to the end of my first year as Parish Priest here in Finningham, I believe that we are blessed as a community with people who are always ready to say to their neighbours in need, 'Here am I.'



FINNINGHAM CHURCHYARD the FABRIC and DONATIONS

I should like to take this opportunity to thank all of those people whether 'churchgoer' or otherwise who so conscientiously help to maintain the churchyard at St Bartholomew's Church and carry out other maintenance duties relating to the church itself. At the same time I am aware that many people unselfishly contribute financially to the church; 'thank you.'

Every five years churches undergo an extensive professional inspection, free of charge, called a Quinquennial Report. The findings are sent to the church body and list all that is needed doing to the fabric of the building and the immediate area; highlighting all manner of structural deficiencies of a serious nature through to the mundane such as a squeaky door needing WD40! The report is very comprehensive, listing works on a grade of A-E with regard to importance; very much a wish list, and invariably coming out at literally many thousands of pounds; on buildings of several hundred years old there is obviously always money to be spent.

St Bartholomew's has just had such an inspection and I am awaiting the Inspecting Architects report. As soon as I am in possession of the report the Parochial Church Council will prioritise the findings thrown up by the Architect and where finances permit begin to alleviate the most pressing problems. I will keep the community of Finningham in the loop, as I know it is important that people are aware of where their finances are being used, as well as knowing that the church building is being suitably cared for.

I am always happy to speak to anyone with regard 'church business,' please do flag up anything you wish to bring to my attention.

Theodore Boone: The Abduction

John Grisham (Hodder & Stoughton)

Theodore Boone is back. The thirteen-year-old who wants to be a trial lawyer when he grows up becomes involved in solving another mystery.

April Finnemore, Theo's best friend, disappears from her bedroom in Strattenburg, USA during a night when her mother and father are away from home. The local police have a suspect: a distant relative, Jack Leeper. Theo organises a manhunt with kids on bikes searching and handing out leaflets offering a reward for information leading to Leeper's capture.

Mum and Dad are there to offer support. Uncle lke is there to do things Theo cannot because of his age. The police are there to appear baffled.

Grisham has written another easy-to-read mystery tale for youngsters that explains court procedures clearly and simply. The appearance of yet-to-be lawyer Theo representing his 'client' at the Animal Court is an absolute delight.

LIVES REMEMBERED

Molly Noble (and Leslie Noble) 26 July 1929 - 7 December 2017

A former Westhorpe Road resident, Molly Noble has sadly passed away. The funeral service was held on 4th January at St Barts with burial at Stowmarket cemetery, joining her late husband Leslie (26 September 1927 - 16 February 2005).

The couple came to Finningham from Eye in 1955, first residing with their two young children at 5 Gislingham Road. They went on to have three more children at this address. The cottage was a two up two down with no running water or sewer, and a block of toilets at the bottom of the garden.

In 1961 they moved to Westhorpe Road where their sixth child was born. Leslie was the local chimney sweep, handyman and painter and decorator. Molly was kept busy looking after the family, and pursuing her interests in knitting and gardening. Leslie and his sons helped maintain St Barts with various repair works including working on the roof. He later joined a well known builder as a painter and decorator.

Finningham was a very well served village in those days. At one time there were two shops, one of which also had the Post Office and petrol pumps. There were three public houses. Roundsmen delivered bread, milk, meat, coal, paraffin and groceries to the door. Good bus services to Stowmarket and Diss, and a railway station were enjoyed.

Molly and Leslie lived in Westhorpe Road until 2000, a total of 45 years, before Leslie's ill health forced them to move to a bungalow in Stowmarket. The Noble family would like to thank all those who attended Molly's funeral.

Gloria Jackson

The funeral of Gloria Jackson (nee Such) was held on 28 March at the West Suffolk Crematorium. In 2006 she and husband Richard (1920-2013) moved to Finningham to be closer to their family. Born in Southampton, Gloria went on to join the WAAF during WW2, and met and married Richard, then an RAF Sergeant.

After the war the family moved around the country with Richard's career in the Ministry of Agriculture. In 1971 Richard achieved his life-



long dream and became a dairy farmer in Cheshire. In all their moves Gloria relished meeting and helping new people, and making many friends.

In Cheshire, Gloria evolved her great faith and contributed to their local parish at St Oswald's, Lower Peover. In 1986 they retired to Hampshire becoming active in their new parish at St Andrew's, Tiptoe. Gloria became her area's President of Women's Aglow.

With their final move to Finningham they again made new friends and supported the benefice, including the Flower Festival. On Richard's death, Gloria moved to Westhorpe Hall residential care home where she endeared herself to the staff and loved to soak up the sun on hot summer's days.

Tributes from family, friends and acquaintances refer to her as an outgoing, loving and loyal person, who also stuck to a strong moral code and unwavering religious conviction. Gloria and Richard both strove to improve their lives but were also generous in their support of others, family, friends and strangers.
