You will remember that, in the last issue of this Newsletter, you were informed that the Parish Council was in the process of purchasing additional equipment for the recreational area of the Green. This followed consultation with the young of the Village, to find out what they wanted.

The order was placed to the supplier and the excavation of the site for the bark infill was underway when representation was regarding the traffic speeds made to find a different site for the additional equipment.

The digging was completed, and the Parish Council agreed to put any further installation work on hold until a meeting was arranged to discuss the problem.

Fostering – Did You Know....

That there are different types of fostering placements and that there is a demand for all of these?

There are children that are in the care system for just a short while, they may have poorly parents and no other family to look after them at the moment, they are likely to be settled into a school environment and simply require someone to keep them safe and loved for a short period of time.

There are children that are unable to return home due to varying circumstances, these young people need a forever home. They need a family to commit time, empathy, love and understanding to them. They need someone who will be committed to them till they reach the age of 18 ers too. years old and possibly beyond.

Every child that is placed into care has a level of need, whether that need is to be safe and secure for a short period or long term, depends on the family circumstances. There are also young people who have highly complex needs. These young

people require resilient carers to help them through the tough times that they face and let them know that everything is going to be ok.

Sometimes, it's not a child that needs a fostering placement but a child and their parent(s), these are called Mother and Baby placements. Although the name can be misleading. I have placed father and baby's with our carers, mothers and their children who are not babies, i.e. 8 years old and even Mum, Dad and baby placements. The idea of these types of placement is to guide parents so that they can successfully parent alone.

All of the above are very rewarding placements and they give so much to our young people and to the car-
