

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

This story includes Chinese mythical kings and Scottish drug smugglers and the balance of the global economy once depended on the tea trade. Our story begins with a man boiling water beneath a tree in China three and a half thousand years ago...

Tea, as you may know, originates far away in China during the Shang dynasty, during the second millenium BC. Legend has it that the ancient Shang king Shannong discovered tea when he was boiling water on a fire to cook with under the branches of a tree belonging to the species 'camellia sinensis'. Some of the leaves of this tree fell into his pot and Shannong decided to drink it anyway because he was an adventurous kind of guy as well as inventing tea Shannong is also revered in China as the first farmer, the inventor of the plough and the man who discovered the waterproofing effects of horse urine. He loved its favour so much he called it "te", meaning "bitter herb" in the Min-nan dialect of Chinese.

For the better part of two thousand years tea was used as a medicinal potion in China until the Tang dynasty about 1300 years ago. During this time green tea became a popular drink among the nobility and was frequently drank at state receptions and parties held for the Emperor. Tea bags were made from hand sewn paper envelopes in various sizes depending upon the number of people being served. Another important development in "tea culture" were the creation of elaborate rituals which were designed to show respect and honour to those with whom one drank tea. Chinese tea and it's accompanying culture spread to many other Asian countries including Japan, Korea, Vietnam, Siam (modern day Thailand) and even as far as the distant kingdom of Java, which also imported coffee from Africa.

Europeans discovered tea when it was drank by Portugese merchants in the 16th century during the Chinese Ming dynasty. European

Next time you go to T@Barts and you enjoy nations desperately wanted to buy tea from economy was based upon a silver standard. Tea was considered a high luxury product and was packaged accordingly: those fancy Ming vases you see in museums were originally intended purely as a means to contain the, much more valuable, tea during it's transport to Europe.

> During the 18th century the British, Dutch and French went to great lengths to set up their own tea plantations in India, Indonesia and Sri Lanka but production could not keep up with demand so Chinese tea was still needed. The Chinese slapped a whopping 400% tax on tea at the turn of the 19th century, prompting the British to send their first ambassador to China in order to try and negotiate a better deal. He failed and in response an enterprising Scottish merchant called William Jardine set up a trading port on a small island called Hong Kong, hoping to quietly export the tea through his Chinese friends on the mainland. Unfortunately, word of this tax dodging Caledonian smuggler got out to the Qing Emperor who shut down Jardine's business and put his unlucky Chinese partners to death by a thousand cuts. Jardine would subsequently switch his business from exporting tea to importing opium and that led to a whole mess of trouble between Britain and China which we won't address here today.

> The Chinese had, however, greatly overestimated their trading position. European tastes were moving away from the Chinese green tea and towards black and red teas such as darjeeling and Earl Grey which were much easier to grow in the British-controlled Indian highlands. The British also started drinking their tea in the Indian style; with milk. This was a custom the Indians had learned from the Afghans who had been the first people to add milk to their tea... goats milk in their case.

As tea became more common the price dropped and it became a drink enjoyed by the masses as opposed to the expensive luxury it had once been. By James Bell 20

Action Fraud has received 63 reports about a scam in which fraudsters target people with offers of "low cost" loans or "free" government grants. What the victims aren't told is that the money they'll receive is actually an advance payment for Universal Credit. The criminals use the personal information they've obtain under false pretences to make an application in the victim's name. After the fraudsters have taken their "fee" from the advance payment, the victim is then left to pay back the total amount once their repayments begin. How you can protect yourself:

- Never share your personal or financial information with someone you don't know and trust, especially if it's in response to an offer of "free money" or a "free grant".
- Department for Work & Pensions (DWP) staff will never approach you in the street or ask for your personal/financial details over social media.

If you have concerns about your benefits, you should visit www.gov.uk/contact-jobcentre-plus

 If you suspect your identity may have been stolen, you can check your credit rating quickly and easily online. You should do this every few months anyway, using a reputable service provider and following up on any unexpected or suspicious results.
