Our tubs have been re-potted! (Thank you Mandy and crew)






The Bells of St Margarets

The 5 bells and their fittings have been lowered and sent off to Taylor's Bell Foundry in Loughborough to be repaired or re-cast. An new treble bell will be added, and the church tower restored.



Brussels sprouts

I used to listen to Ken Bruce on BBC Radio 2 and enjoy the friendly banter that took place between Ken and his many regular listeners. Starting round about October Ken would start to be advised that now was the time to put the Brussels sprouts on so that they would be ready for Christmas.

I appreciate that Brussels sprouts are not to everybody's liking but that could be because we tend to overcook them but I think they have a buttery flavour. May I suggest the following recipe for your Christmas meal?

Firstly, don't cook too many Depending on how many guests will be sitting down for the meal, and on how many other vegetables you will be serving, decide on 2, 3 or 4 sprouts per person. Cut them in half lengthwise and par cook them by steaming. (I use Lakeland steam cooking bags). Cook for a little less than the time shown on the bag.

Just before dishing up, melt some butter in a frying pan and fry the sprouts for a short time with flaked almonds.

Why not do a dummy run with your next roast dinner? Enjoy!

Book Review: HITLER STALIN MUM AND DAD

by Daniel Finkelstein, published this year, £25. Available from the library.

The author is a member of the House of Lords and was editor of The Times. His parents and grandparents, born in Germany and Poland, were caught up in the madness that swept 20th century Europe. He tells their stories and rings a warning that what happened to them could happen to his children. "Absolutely, it could."

After reading it you may wonder, as I did, why your education never included a discussion of the "blood libel", the spurious basis of so much anti-Jewish violence. Also, why were you fed a version of history from which Britain's role in restricting emigration from Nazi Europe was omitted? It is a significant, important book which will take you to hell and back. I read it twice.
