Friends of Finningham- Fundraising Walk in aid of Church Roof Repairs

When walking through the churchyard I am sure lots of you will have noticed that the church roof has the need for some long-overdue repairs some which are already underway. The church is the only building that we have in the village to use for events, the only other place is the Village Green. Whether or not you are a churchgoer you may or may not be aware that the church is not just used for church services but can be used for many other things e.g. coffee mornings, a place to meet up with friends for a social evening, concerts, Parish Council meetings, Friends of Finningham meetings to name but a few. So it would be such a shame to see it fall into disrepair.

The cost of repairing the church roof will be in the region of £20,000 The Parochial Church Council are actively looking to see if they can obtain a grant towards the cost of this work. But there will be a shortfall. Monies raised from the flower festival will also go towards this work.

The Friends of Finningham have decided to hold a fundraising walk on Sunday 6th July to raise money towards the roof repairs.

The walk will begin at 10am at Street Forge Workshops. There will be additional Parking at Thornham Magna Village Hall which is the other side of the road.

Should anyone wish to have lunch afterwards it is up to individuals to book with one of the local pubs.

There are 3 options as to where you can leave the walk: at 4, 5, or 6 miles.

The cost of the walk is £5 per adult, children and well behaved dogs free. We appreciate that some people may not be able to do the walk but would still like to donate. 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National Service -5

The occupants of my billet changed regularly as those conscripts coming to the end of their stint went home. Most of them shared stories of the places that they had visited. A trip to the Nile in Uganda was one of them. I decided that I would make that my next trip. It involved hitch-hiking, which is always a chancy thing to do. There is no guarantee that anybody would stop for you.

I was told that when you reached a particular town (this is where I wished I had kept a diary: I would then be able to tell you the name of the town!) if you waited at a particular street corner at 4pm, a Land Rover would give you a lift into the Game Reserve. Sure enough, I got the lift and stayed with a family. They were the only family there and their neighbours were the wildlife.

In the morning the driver took me to the ferry on the Nile. As we were driving through some tall grass, he stopped. About 30 feet away was an enormous bull elephant. I, in my innocence, was not scared but the driver was very nervous and kept the Land Rover in gear ready for a speedy get-away. We got to the ferry without further incidents.

Have you a picture in mind of what the ferry might look like? I imagine whatever the picture you have, it would be nothing like the real thing. It was a wooden platform with ropes attached to pull it from one side to the other. It could only take one car at a time. However, it got us across the river which was only about 30 yards wide. The driver dropped me off and said that he would not be coming back that way. I was not too concerned because I knew that there was a hotel nearby where I could spend the night.

There was a small boat that made trips along the river to view the wildlife on the banks. I could not afford to hire the boat by myself so waited in the hope that I could join a group. I waited. I saw nobody. And I waited. And waited. It came to the point where it was too late to do the river trip so I trudged off to the hotel to book a room for the night. Bearing in mind that I had not seen a soul all day, I was surprised that they "had no vacancies". I had already spied a small round, mud hut with a pole in the middle holding up a thatch type roof. That would be my room for the night! I collected kindling to make a fire to heat up my tin of baked beans. The smoke also stopped the bugs living in the thatch from coming down to feed on me during the night!!

I was surprised how noisy the hippos were during the night. Plenty of grunting sounds.

I did not have to wait too long the next morning for a car to appear on the other side of the river and then parked my side of the river. It was an Asian family and I have no idea how they managed to pack so many people into such a small car. I joined them on the trip along the Nile and they generously refused my offer to pay my way. I was excited and delighted to see the wild animals so close to the water's edge. Being on the river you were able to get closer to them than on terra firma.

After another night in my hut, I did not have to wait too long for a car to arrive, travelling in the direction that would take me back to Kenya. They were two business men who took me out of the game park where I wanted to go right and they were going to the left. They dropped me off and said they would be coming back that way later in the day and would gladly give me a lift into Kampala, Uganda if I had not already secured a lift. As they drove off in a cloud of dust, I realised I had left my camera in their car.

I proceeded to walk to the town, knowing that I had all day to get there. A schoolboy gave me a lift on the back of his pushbike for a short distance. It was not the most comfortable of lifts that I experienced.

The road ended at a T junction. On one comer was a police station and I was in there giving my details as I was sure that they would notice my camera and pop in there to report that they had my camera. As I left I spied their car at a petrol station at the junction. Evidently they each assumed that the camera belonged to each other.

They duly took me to Kampala and I returned, safely to camp in Nairobi.

Next time I will tell you how I celebrated my 21st birthday.
